

## **EVERYTHING EMOJI**

Fred Benenson's *Emoji Dick* was created in collaboration with over eight hundred Amazon Mechanical Turk workers. Benenson worked with one Amazon Mechanical Turk to translate an estimated 10,000 sentences from Herman Melville's iconic American novel. Another set of workers voted to decide on the most popular versions of every sentence in *Emoji Dick*. In total this book took 3,795,980 seconds to complete. Each worker was paid per translation (five cents) and for their vote (two cents). This project was crowd- sourced by Benenson using Kickstarter in 2009. In conjunction with *Emoji Dick*, the library presents alternative versions of *Moby Dick*.
