ADMISSIONS

CREDIT. (a) Applicants who are high school graduates, or have attained by other means a level of development corresponding to that of high school graduates. (b) Applicants who are entitled to honorable dismissal from other collegiate institutions.

NO CREDIT. (a) Adults interested in arts and crafts as an avocation. (b) Students still attending high school may enroll in appropriate art classes.

CHILDREN. Children (9-14 years) may enroll in the Creative Art class.

A transcript is not required, unless the student plans to continue his studies in the regular college year.

The regulations outlined in the College Bulletin apply to all regular students and to those who expect to enroll in the Fall term.

VETERANS

The College maintains the office of the Veterans Coordinator where counseling is available for applicants for admission under Public Laws 16, 550 and 894, the California State Educational Assistance program for veterans, and all other educational assistance programs for veterans. Government application and transfer forms are available at the office of the Veterans Coordinator at the College. Assistance is given to the veterans in the preparation of these forms. It is advisable to request counseling from this office, particularly in the case of transfer veterans from other institutions.

SCHOLARSHIPS

A limited number of summer session scholarships are awarded to high school and junior college students. Information is generally available at all high schools and junior colleges. Secondary art teachers' scholarships are awarded on a basis of priority of application and endorsement by principal.

THE COLLEGE

The California College of Arts and Crafts is entering its fifty-first year of Summer Session. As a College of Fine Arts and Crafts it is founded upon the premise that a sound professional training and a broadly related liberal arts program are necessary to equip the professional artist and teacher to meet the needs of a rapidly changing society. The College, under the authority of the State of California, grants the B.F.A., B.A.Ed. and the M.F.A. degrees. Accredited by Western College Association.

SUMMER PROGRAM

The summer program has been designed to stimulate teachers and supervisors of art and to increase the proficiency of artists and craftsmen. Classes provide as nearly as possible the equivalent of a regular semester's study. Teachers may receive in-service credits or credits toward a degree program. Regular students may begin their program of study during the Summer Session. There are also classes for children, young people, and others interested in arts and crafts as an avocation.

FACULTY

The faculty of the College is staffed by men and women who have achieved recognition in their respective fields. Instructors are practicing artists and craftsmen, who exhibit regularly. Students benefit from their professional experiences.

SPECIAL COURSES

A Religious Art Program is being offered so that the students may become acquainted with the various forms and uses of art in religious expression and have the opportunity of creating their own symbolic representations.


Subjects offered are in world religious art history and studio practice. A student desiring to pursue the Religious Art Program may register in the studio of his field of interest.

There will be one seminar meeting each week for the correlation of the creative aspects of the students' own work, group discussion, and the introduction of guest speakers. There will be a two day conference on Art in

Religion during the period of the Summer Session with panels representing both art and religion.

LOCATION

The California College of Arts and Crafts, located at Broadway and College, Oakland, offers many advantages to the art student. Situated in the mild temperate climate of the San Francisco Bay Region, with its many cultural and scenic attractions, museums and galleries of San Francisco are within easy traveling distance. The San Francisco Symphony Orchestra, and the numerous outdoor concert areas offer an excellent opportunity to those interested in music. Outdoor studio space is provided for most classes.



SERVICES

An art reference library, a visual aid center, a cafeteria, and a student supply shop are maintained on the campus for the use and convenience of all students. The housing bureau of the California College of Arts and Crafts maintains a registry of nearby apartments and rooms in private homes. Early arrival will aid in securing the best accommodations. The College does not maintain dormitories.
