Summer Session Facts

The Eighteenth Annual Summer Session of the California School of Arts and Crafts will open on Monday, June 23, and close on Friday, August 1, 1924. This session has become an established feature of the work of the school, and is recognized as an annual event of real and increasing importance to art education in the Western States.

Supervisors of the arts and crafts in city schools, special teachers in the high schools, grade teachers and teachers in the rural schools will find courses adapted to their needs. Courses will be organized for students in the elementary and high schools. Children's classes will also be organized.

Many of the advanced courses given are especially adapted to those preparing for life work as designers, illustrators, commercial, poster and advertising artists, interior decorators and craftsmen in the metals, wood, textiles and pottery.

General Information

Location of School:

During the 1924 Summer Session, classes will be held at both the school's Berkeley location, 2119 Allston Way, and at its new Oakland site, 5212 Broadway. The Berkeley school is located within half a block of the University of California campus, within one block of the Southern Pacific and Key Route electric trains, and is near the terminus of both Oakland and local street car lines. Students desiring to take work at both schools will find street car connections good, inasmuch as the College Avenue cars pass directly in front of the Oakland school and within a half block of the Berkeley school.

Registration:

Early registration is always desirable. Students may register for the Summer Session at any time during March, April, May and June. Definite class assignments will be made on Saturday, June 21, and Monday, June 23. Class work will begin on Tuesday, June 24.

Tuition and Laboratory Fees;

The tuition fee for full day attendance is \$30.00; for half day attendance, \$18.00; for special course in Constitution, \$10.00; for special course in Public Education in California, \$10.00; for both special courses taken by one person, \$15.00. Laboratory fees for metal work, \$3.50; for basketry, \$3.00; for primary construction, \$2.50; for elementary and for advanced weaving, \$2.50; for modeling, \$.50. Note: Full-day students may take either of the two special courses without extra charge; half-day students may take either or both of the two special courses at the nominal additional charge of \$3.50

Special Classes:

for each course taken.

Special courses will be organized for high school and elementary school students desiring six weeks of intensive training in the arts and crafts. Special children's classes will also be organized.

Faculty;

A staff of trained instructors has been engaged. All have had extended craft and teaching experience.
